Surf Report

4th Sunday in Lent 19th March 2023

Bringing Jesus to our Gold Coast community

Hello Surfers!

I can't believe it's been a year! What a whirlwind, and I'm so looking forward to many more with you from here on in.

PARISH MEETING TODAY (19th) AT 8.30 am

Today's Old Testament reading speaks to us of the anointing of Israel's third King (while the second was still alive!) (1 Samuel 16:1-13). David was the youngest son of Jesse from Bethlehem, was small in stature, handsome to the point of being 'pretty', and a keeper of the sheep. When viewing all the sons of Jesse, the prophet of God, Samuel, thought the oldest was the most likely to receive the anointing, but God had other plans. Verse 7 in this chapter is telling:

But the Lord said to Samuel, 'Do not look on his appearance or on the height of his stature, because I have rejected him; for the Lord does not see as mortals see; they look on the outward appearance, but the Lord looks on the heart.' (NRSV)

Praise God that His ways are not our ways. That same youngest son would write for us arguably the most recognisable psalm that brings comfort to so many even today, and is our assigned psalm (Ps. 23). Only a shepherd King could understand the importance that a shepherd brings to the life of their flocks, how spiritual presence brings comfort in the face of fear and evil, and how at the end of this life there is another that awaits us that lasts forever.

Our New Testament readings speak to us of light and vision.

The Apostle Paul's letter to the church in Ephesus exhorts us to live as children of light, and that the fruit of that type of living produces goodness and righteousness (Eph. 5:8-14). Paul encourages us to not only keep away from the works of darkness, but in fact to expose them where we find them. The things that may – for a time – bring short term gains are simply not worth the long term costs.

In our Gospel reading we find Jesus again using one of those 'I am' (Yahweh) statements, describing Himself as "the Light of the world" (Jn. 9:1-41). In such a long text it can be difficult to put together a sermon that covers what is assigned without blowing out our time together, and this text has two theological themes that can cause us issues; i) the relationships between sin,

disability and healing, and ii) the use of the phrase 'the Jews' in such a derogatory manner.

Rather than taking up our whole hour together this morning exploring those themes, I will instead be focussing on what it means for Jesus proclaiming Himself to be "the Light of the world", spiritual blindness and how we might look at the implications for us when we truly see Jesus for who He is.
